The year 2010 marks the 30<sup>th</sup> birthday of the Fund which grew out of the desire of civil servants and employees of the semi-states and commercial bodies such as An Post, Eircom

and Coillte to respond in a modest but effective way to the needs of the less well-off in the poorer regions of the world. While this report deals with activities in 2009 it is felt appropriate to draw the attention of subscribers and wellwishers to the age of the Fund and what it has achieved in the thirty years of its operation. Since the foundation of the Fund grants totalling €7.5 million were awarded for 1,535 micro projects in a wide range of developing countries. These projects were aimed at poverty reduction with basic needs being the prime target. Many communities are now enjoying the benefits of clean water, primary education, health care, community development and income generating activities as a result of grants made. A notable feature of the Fund is how low overhead costs have been kept since its inception. While many non governmental organisations and charities spend a sizeable amount of their funds on administrative and publicity costs, the administrative costs of the Fund have never exceeded 5% of income.

The low cost of administration is due in no small part to the work of the many voluntary workers who gave of their time and expertise over the years and the work of the Fund would not have been possible without the generous and loyal support of its subscribers many of whom continue to contribute after their formal retirement. We are indeed grateful to all. For the Fund to continue its work it needs the ongoing support of subscribers and while the difficult economic conditions that obtain at present makes it difficult to ask people to part with their money we do appeal to existing members of the Fund to try and recruit one new subscriber among their colleagues. 
#### New members are urgently needed to help finance the work of the Fund Their needs are still great - Please help them
