"I only want to go to School!"

Another year is upon us and time again for the Annual Report from Combined Services Third World Fund. It is opportune to recall, particularly for any new staff, that the CSTWF was established in 1980 by the Trade Unions. Its aim is to provide improvements to the quality of life to people, less well off than us, in the developing world from voluntary contributions, subscriptions and donations kindly made by staff. Since then over €7million has been granted by CSTWF on development projects and emergency aid grants in many developing countires.

During 2012 a little girl told us that she was the first member of her family ever to attend school as a result of a school building project sponsored by the Fund. We were also very happy to be in a position provide vital life saving equipment for maternity and children's hospitals.

Supplies of clean water always remain a challenge. Many villages and schools now have a year round supply following financing of various water saving methods by the Fund. This is particularly relevant to poor primary schools where proper latrines have been erected which result in a reduction of infections suffered by the children.

We are always amazed to see on many occasions during the year that small primary schools can be built for €7,000 or €8,000 or less. Likewise new modern classroom extensions to existing schools can be erected for similar or smaller amounts.

Like everybody else, the Fund is suffering from a reduction in income and your help is required more than ever. Please do continue to support the Fund and also help by recruiting new members. Why not organise a fund raising event through your Office or Department? Do remember to make arrangements to carry on your subscription, even after you have retired from service. CSTWF administrative costs are always kept to the lowest possible levels and have never exceeded 5% of the Fund's income.



The Fund awarded 62 grants for Projects in 21 developing countries during the year under review. As can be seen from the pie chart (in €000's) 48.2% of the amount granted, €184,950, went to educational projects. The Fund places a high value on education as it is central to development, enabling people to overcome poverty. It is the "fishing rod" rather than the handout. Health projects were also high on the list of beneficial projects receiving 12.1% or €46.500 of awards made. Better health makes an important contribution to human happiness and economic progress as healthy people live longer and are more productive. Other sectors to benefit from grants made were Agriculture, Community and Industrial Development, and the provision of water and sanitation. All of the grants made were aimed at meeting the basic needs of people in developing countries. It is a firm belief of the Fund that if people can meet these needs they will develop themselves and their countries.
